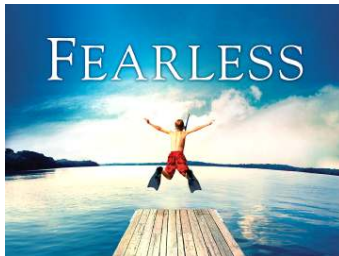

Under the Ombú Tree – by Fletcher L. Tink

The Ombú Tree. It's simply an overgrown shrub rising tall into the air. It does not grow elegantly like other trees; rather its multiple trunks twist and turn, wrestling like giant boa constrictors. Its numerous branches droop heavily toward the ground. Its leaves are thick like elephant ears.
